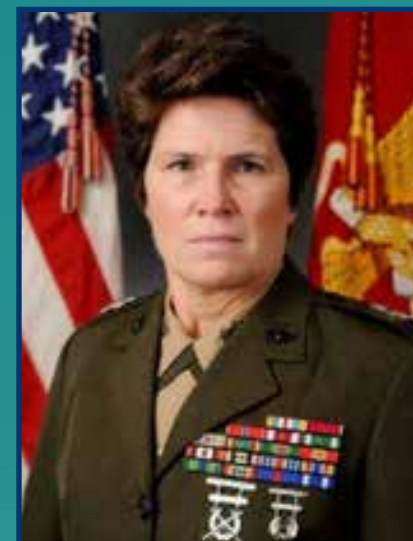

Dr. Monique D. Walker, LMFT is a couple and family therapist at the DC Vet Center #214, and in therapist and AAMFT Approved Supervisor candidate in private practice in Dupont Circle, as well as an adjunct professor, trainer, and diversity consultant. Dr. Walker uses Eye Movement Desensitization

Reprocessing (EMDR) to help clients heal from acute and complex trauma including PTSD, MST (military sexual trauma) and domestic/intimate partner violence. Dr. Walker is also a relational therapist helping partners/couples and families improve their connection, repair and/or deepen their trust in one another, and experience more profoundly just and pleasurable lives and relationships. Dr. Walker's research interests include the intersectional experiences of racial, gender, and sexual minorities, trauma-informed holistic healing practices, and mental health disparities and public policy. Dr. Walker has published several journal articles and book chapters, and has presented her work locally, nationally, and internationally on a range of topics usually related to social justice and the impact of various forms of oppression in marginalized communities. Dr. Walker is actively involved in community-based work related to many socio-political and social justice issues happening in the world around us. Dr. Walker has a deep passion and commitment Veterans and their families as the daughter of a US Army Veteran, and sister, cousin, niece, and friend to many who have and continue to serve.

KAYLA WILLIAMS



Kayla M. Williams is a Senior Fellow and Director of the Military, Veterans, and Society Program at the Center for a New American Security (CNAS). She previously served as Director of the Center for Women Veterans at the Department of Veterans Affairs, where she was the primary adviser to the

Secretary on department policies, programs, and legislation affecting women veterans. Kayla spent eight years at the RAND Corporation researching servicemember and veteran health needs and benefits, international security, and intelligence policy. Ms. Williams was enlisted for five years as an Arabic linguist, serving in a Military Intelligence company of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault). She is the author of *Love My Rifle More Than You: Young and Female in the U.S. Army*, a memoir about her deployment to Iraq, and *Plenty of Time When We Get Home: Love and Recovery in the Aftermath of War*, about her family's journey from war trauma to healing. Kayla graduated cum laude with a BA in English Literature from Bowling Green State University and earned an MA in International Affairs with a focus on the Middle East from American University. She is a member of the Army Education Advisory Committee and Department of Labor Advisory Committee on Veterans' Employment, Training, and Employer Outreach; a former member of the VA Advisory Committee on Women Veterans; a 2013 White House Woman Veteran Champion of Change; and a 2015 Lincoln Award recipient.

COLONEL KRISTIN M. BAKER



Colonel Kristin Baker is currently a member of the Army’s Talent Management Task force. Her previous assignment was as the Assistant Director for Intelligence, Joint Staff J2 in August 2016. From 2013-2016, she served as Commander, JIOCEUR Analytic Center, Molesworth England.

Prior to command, Colonel Baker served as the V Corps G2 and Chief of Assessments, forward-deployed to ISAF Joint Command, Kabul Afghanistan.

COL Baker was born in Dickinson, North Dakota and entered active duty upon graduation from the United States Military Academy, West Point, New York in 1990. She began her career as a second lieutenant serving as an intelligence platoon leader and operations officer for C Company, 302nd MI Battalion in Mainz-Finthen, Germany. As a First Lieutenant, she deployed to the Middle East as a Patriot missile battalion S2 while assigned to 6-43 Air Defense Artillery Battalion, 69th Air Defense Brigade, Ansbach, Germany.

Following the Intelligence Advanced Course, COL Baker was assigned to Fort Hood Texas where she served as a collection manager and intelligence plans officer assigned to the 205th MI Brigade, III Corps Headquarters. She deployed to Bosnia as Commander, B Company, 303rd MI Battalion during OPERATION JOINT ENDEAVOR and was later assigned to 4th Brigade, 1st Cavalry Division where she served as an aviation brigade intelligence officer.

COL Baker was then assigned to Human Resources Command in Washington, DC as an assignment officer for Army intelligence officers. She completed her DC tour serving on the National Defense Intelligence College staff as an Information Operations Course Coordinator. Following Army Command and General Staff College, COL Baker transferred to Germany where she served as Chief, Combating Terrorism Branch, United States Army Europe, and Executive Officer to the G2. Her Germany tour was followed by an assignment to Operations Division, United States Army Pacific Command Joint Intelligence Operations Center where she completed her tour as the Chief of Operations Division.

COL Baker holds a Bachelor’s of Science degree from the United States Military Academy in Engineering Psychology, a Master’s of Science in Strategic Intelligence from the National Defense Intelligence College and a Master’s of Science in Strategic Studies from the U.S. Army War College. Her military education includes the Intelligence Officer’s Basic Course, the Intelligence Officer’s Advanced Course, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, the Joint Command Warfighting School, and the U.S. Army War College. Her badges include the parachutist badge and the air assault badge. She has also been awarded the Honorable Order of Saint Barbara’s Award and the Knowlton Award.

COL Baker is married to fellow Army officer, COL Mark Kjørness. They have three daughters, Cassie, Ashley, and Brenna.

FIRST LIEUTENANT ANGELA MAY DIMATTIA



First Lieutenant Angela DiMattia started her military career in 2012 by joining the Georgia National Guard assigned to the 1177th Transportation Battalion. She received her commission in 2015 in Military Intelligence after graduating from Columbus State University, earning a BS degree in Exercise

Physiology, with a concentration in Military Leadership. It was upon her commissioning that she transitioned to active duty status.

Her first duty assignment as a 2LT was a Military Intelligence, Company Intelligence Support Team (COIST), platoon leader in D. Co, 52nd Brigade Engineer Battalion (BEB), 2nd Infantry Brigade Combat Team (2IBCT), 4th Infantry Division (4ID) at Fort Carson, CO. In 2018, 1LT DiMattia served as both the 2IBCT Brigade Public Affairs Officer and the Brigade Family Readiness Liaison during the Brigade’s deployment during the Resolute Support Mission. 1LT DiMattia was then assigned to Peterson AFB to serve as the Strategic Communications Officer for Space and Missile Defense Command (SMDC).

In August 2017, she was selected for the All Army Soldier-Athlete program where she played softball for the Army in the Armed Forces Sports Championships. She then competed as a Figure Bodybuilder in the 2018 Arnold Sports Festival International where she placed 2nd from competitors around the world. Most recently, 1LT DiMattia won the title as the United States of America’s (USOA’s) Ms. Colorado 2019.

1LT DiMattia volunteers in her spare time as the Fallen Hero Coordinator for the Soldier Marathon located in Fort Benning, GA. Since its founding in 2010, the Soldier Marathon has donated over \$250,000 to military beneficiaries such as the National Infantry Museum, House of Heroes, Team RWB, and the Fort Benning MWR. Her contribution to the organization allows participants to learn stories of fallen heroes and run in their honor. She continues to use this platform throughout her reign as USOA Ms. Colorado.

1LT DiMattia is engaged to Creston M. Veith and they currently reside in Colorado Springs, CO.

COLONEL JENNIFER ANTHIS



Colonel Anthis was commissioned in December 1987 and has had a varied career in the Marine Corps Reserves, spending most of her time mobilized in support of active duty units. As a lieutenant, she completed Ground Supply Officer's Course and was assigned as the S4A for MAG-16 Headquarters

at MCAS Tustin, CA. She then joined the reserve staff of 23rd Marine Regiment until dropping to the IRR where she remained until her discharge in 1998. Reappointed a Captain in the Reserves in 2003, she served with Anti-Tank Training Company both as a drilling reservist and then mobilized as the acting I-1. Subsequent assignments include deployments to Djibouti, Iraq and Afghanistan. General Gary L. Thomas is currently serving as the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

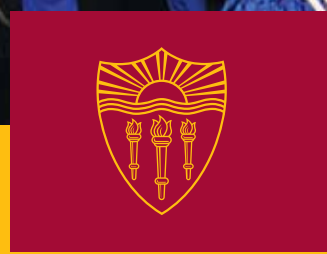
A native of Austin, Texas, he graduated from the University of Texas and was commissioned in 1984. He previously served as the Deputy Commandant for Programs and Resources.

Rear Admiral Joanna Nunan assumed the duties of the Assistant Commandant for Human Resources (CG-1) in July of 2019.

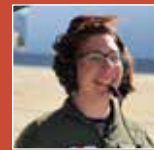
